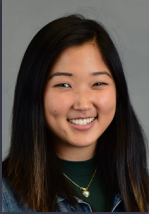

U.S. Figure Skating is the national governing body for the sport of figure skating as recognized by the U.S. Olympic Committee and International Skating Union. The headquarters and administrative offices are in Colorado Springs, Colo., as are SKATING magazine, the official publication of U.S. Figure Skating, and the U.S. and World Figure Skating Museum and Hall of Fame.

U.S. Figure Skating is charged with the development of the sport on all levels in the United States, including developing athletes and officials, sanctioning events and exhibitions, and establishing the rules and guidelines by which the sport is governed.

ABOUT THE SPORT

Figure skating is comprised of five disciplines: ladies, men's, pairs, ice dance and synchronized. The first four are contested at the Olympic Winter Games

TEAM USA

More than 100 athletes make up Team USA in ladies, men's, pairs and ice dance for the 2017-18 season. The athletes will represent the United States at more than 30 international competitions while receiving funding and support to pursue excellence in the sport of figure skating.

Fourteen athletes will represent Team USA at the Olympic Winter Games PyeongChang 2018: Three ladies, three men, one pairs team and three ice dance teams.

TELEVISION CONTRACT

In January 2013, U.S. Figure Skating announced two major media rights agreements that guarantee unprecedented coverage of figure skating in the United States through the 2018 Olympic season. The first was a four-year extension of its broadcast rights agreement with NBC and the second was icenetwork's acquisition of all U.S. media rights for International Skating Union (ISU) events through the 2017-18 season.



Through 2018, NBC Sports will broadcast a minimum of 11 hours of live domestic event coverage, including Skate America and the U.S. Figure Skating Championships. During the 2017-18 season, more than 225 hours of skating will air between broadcasts on NBC, NBCSN and the Olympic Channel.

The ISU agreement with icenetwork, a wholly-owned subsidiary of U.S. Figure Skating, operated and managed by MLB Advanced Media (MLBAM), covers multiple distribution platforms and guarantees live coverage of ISU events, including the World Figure Skating Championships, the Four Continents Championships and the Grand Prix of Figure Skating Series, on icenetwork, as well as television coverage on NBC, NBC Sports Network and the Olympic Channel. Approximately 20 hours of icenetwork's ISU figure skating rights will be shown on NBC annually, including the World Championships in primetime during non-Olympic years.

INTERNATIONAL JUDGING SYSTEM (IJS)

ISU USAGE OF THE IJS

At the 50th ISU Congress in Scheveningen, The Netherlands, held in June 2004, the international judging system (IJS) received the two-thirds vote needed to pass, marking the end of the 6.0 system's usage at ISU events.

The system was first tested behind the scenes at various events during the 2002–03 season (the first event to officially use it was the 2003 Nebelhorn Trophy). Adjustments and clarifications have been made throughout the years based on feedback from athletes, coaches and officials.

INTERNATIONAL JUDGING SYSTEM PROGRESS

2002–03 Test events

2003–04 Grand Prix (GP) events

2004–05 All ISU championship events, GP and Junior Grand Prix (JGP)

2005–06 All ISU events

ISU member nations are free to use the system of their choice at national events.

U.S. FIGURE SKATING USAGE

In May 2005, the U.S. Figure Skating Governing Council voted to approve the IJS for use in U.S. Figure Skating qualifying competitions.

The 6.0 judging system has been retained, as necessary, for competitions. At nonqualifying competitions, either the international judging system or the 6.0 judging system may be used at the discretion of the local organizing committee, with a few restrictions.

DIFFERENCE BETWEEN ISU AND U.S. FIGURE

SKATING USAGE OF THE IJS

In all U.S. Figure Skating, ISU and international competitions, the judges' names appear next to their scores.

Should a numerical anomaly become apparent at an ISU senior event, it is addressed by the ISU's

Officials Assessment Commission (OAC). Once an assessment is reached, the name of the official is announced by an independent third party.

Should a judge's score be contested at a U.S. Figure Skating event, the chief referee submits a report to a committee for examination and assessment.

OVERVIEW OF THE IJS

The international judging system is based on cumulative points. Points are awarded for the technical evaluation of the elements combined with points awarded for five program components:

- skating skills
- performance
- transitions
- composition
- interpretation of the music/timing (for ice dance)

In the IJS, if a skater performs more than the defined "well-balanced program" elements, there are no deductions, but the skater will not receive credit for these additional elements (except in ice dance, where there is a 1.0 point deduction for each additional element). If a skater performs fewer elements than required, they receive fewer points, but no reduction in points. Essentially, the IJS rewards skaters for strong performances rather than punishing them for poor performances.

Technical panel officials work as a team to determine the type and difficulty of elements performed by each skater. The judges then independently evaluate the qualities of the elements and the performance as a whole.

Each skater is judged independently from the other competitors, so starting order does not impact a skater's score. Also, placement after the short program is not as important as the point differential between the skaters, so placing low in one segment is not necessarily a bar to winning an event.

INTERNATIONAL JUDGING SYSTEM (IJS)

JUDGES AND OFFICIALS

Skaters are evaluated by a judging panel and a technical panel. The judging panel consists of judges and the referee. The technical panel consists of the technical controller, technical specialist, assistant technical specialist, data operator and video replay operator.

JUDGES

The judges are responsible for evaluating the quality of the technical elements and program components.

REFEREE

The referee is in charge of the event. The referee manages the panel of judges and fulfills certain responsibilities, including setting the schedule, conducting draws, determining certain deductions and deciding protests or disputes.

TECHNICAL CONTROLLER

The technical controller supervises, confirms and authorizes all decisions executed by the technical panel. This individual may question the accuracy of the technical specialists' calls by calling for a review. The final decision is arrived at by a majority vote of the technical specialist, the assistant technical specialist and the technical controller after the element is reviewed and further analyzed at the conclusion of the skater's performance. The technical controller must also confirm that all calls have been accurately entered by the data operator.

The elements are available for review after a skater's performance, and scores can be changed accordingly. Review is over and scores are final once they are posted and announced to the public. These scores can only change if a calculation error is found.

TECHNICAL SPECIALIST AND ASSISTANT TECHNICAL SPECIALIST

These individuals are responsible for identifying each of the executed technical elements and the levels of difficulty of each element in real time according to specific criteria. These individuals also must identify illegal elements and falls.

DATA OPERATOR AND VIDEO REPLAY OPERATOR

The data operator inputs the called elements, the levels of difficulty and falls. The video replay operator is responsible for recording all called elements on video clips for use in the review process.

TECHNICAL EVALUATION

In the technical evaluation, each element of a skater's program is assigned a base value. A group of experts, including experienced skaters and coaches, have determined the base value of each technical element. These element base values give the skaters credit for every element they perform. Some elements, such as spins and step sequences, have been assigned a level of difficulty according to specific criteria. These elements are assigned their base value depending on the level of difficulty.

The quality of each element is marked by the judges using a seven-mark "grade of execution" (GOE) scale: -3, -2, -1, 0, +1, +2, +3. The judges' grade of execution is added to or subtracted from the base value of the element to determine the skater's score for that element.

When a skater executes an element, the technical specialist, monitored by the technical controller, identifies the element, and it is then listed on the judge's screen. The judge then grades the quality of the element.

EXAMPLE

Skater performs a triple Axel

Base Value = 8.5

GOE = +2

Element Score = 10.5

Since a triple Axel's base value is 8.5, a skater has the potential to earn 11.5 points for that jump, or as little as 2.9. The sum of all performed elements, together with their grades of execution, forms the technical score.

EXTRAS

- In the ladies and men's short program and free skate, the base values for all jumps skated in the second half of the program are multiplied by 1.1.
- A skater's program consists of a set number of jumps, spins and step sequences. Skaters exceeding the number of opportunities do not get credit for the additional element, but may run the risk of deductions if a fall occurs. In ice dance only, skaters receive a 1.0 deduction for each extra element performed beyond the maximum allowed.

PROGRAM COMPONENTS

In addition to the technical evaluation, the judges award points on a scale from 0.25 to 10.00, with increments of 0.25, for each program component to express the overall presentation.

For pairs skating and ice dance, there must be equal demonstration of the criteria by both skaters.

These five components are scored for all disciplines and events:

SKATING SKILLS

Defined by overall cleanness and sureness, edge control and flow over the ice surface demonstrated by a command of the skating vocabulary (edges, steps, turns etc.), the clarity of technique and the use of effortless power to accelerate and vary speed.

In evaluating the Skating Skills, the following must be considered:

- Use of deep edges, steps and turns;
- Balance, rhythmic knee action and precision of foot placement;
- Flow and glide;
- Varied use of power, speed and acceleration;
- Use of multi-directional skating;
- Use of one-foot skating.

TRANSITIONS

The varied and purposeful use of intricate footwork, positions, movements and holds that link all elements.

In evaluating the Transitions, the following must be considered:

- Continuity of movements from one element to another (all disciplines);
- Variety (including variety of holds in ice dance);
- Difficulty;
- Quality.

PERFORMANCE

Involvement of the skater/pair/couple physically, emotionally and intellectually as they deliver the intent of the music and composition.

In evaluating the Performance, the following must be considered:

- Physical, emotional intellectual involvement and projection;
- Carriage and clarity of movement;

- Variety and contrast of movements and energy;
- Individuality / personality;
- Unison and “oneness” (pair skating, ice dance);
- Spatial awareness between partners — management of the distance between skaters and management of changes of hold (pair skating, ice dance).

COMPOSITION

An intentionally developed and/or original arrangement of all types of movements according to the principles of musical phrase, space, pattern and structure.

In evaluating the Composition, the following must be considered:

- Purpose (idea, concept, vision, mood);
- Pattern / ice coverage;
- Multidimensional use of space and design of movements;
- Phrase and form (movements and parts structured to match the musical phrase);
- Originality of the composition;

INTERPRETATION OF THE MUSIC/TIMING (ICE DANCE)

The personal, creative, and genuine translation of the rhythm, character and content of music to movement on ice.

In evaluating the Interpretation of the Music (/ Timing), the following must be considered:

- Movement and steps in time to the music (Timing);
- Expression of the music’s character / feeling and rhythm, when clearly identifiable;
- Use of finesse* to reflect the details and nuances of the music;
- Relationship between the skaters reflecting the character and rhythm of the music (pair skating, ice dance);
- Skating primarily to the rhythmic beat for short dance and keeping a good balance between skating to the beat and melody in the free dance (ice dance).

* Finesse is the skater’s refined, artful manipulation of nuances. Nuances are the personal artistic ways of bringing subtle variations to the intensity, tempo and dynamics of the music.

CALCULATIONS

CALCULATING THE TOTAL ELEMENT SCORE (TES)

1. Each technical element has a base point value.
2. Each judge assigns a GOE for each element from a seven-point scale: -3, -2, -1, 0, +1, +2, +3.
3. Among the judges, the highest and lowest GOE is dropped.
4. The remaining GOEs are averaged. This is called the "trimmed mean."
5. The trimmed mean GOE is added to the base value.
6. All technical element scores are added.
7. Deductions are taken.

CALCULATING THE PROGRAM COMPONENTS SCORE (PCS)

1. Each judge assigns a mark to each of the five program components on a scale of 0.25-10.00, using 0.25 increments.
2. Among the judges, the highest and lowest score for each program component is dropped.
3. The remaining scores are averaged. This is called the "trimmed mean."
4. The trimmed mean scores of the five program components are added.
5. The sum of the components is multiplied by the appropriate factor. *Why?* See below:

*The program components are factored to make the perfect PCS level with the perfect TES, hence granting equal importance to each. Since the perfect PCS score is 50, this number is factored to roughly equal what each discipline is capable of scoring in the TES. For example, in the ladies short program, women today are capable of scoring around 40 in the TES. So the PCS is factored by 0.8, lowering the 50 to a 40.

CALCULATING THE FINAL COMPETITION SCORE

1. TES + PCS (factored) = Segment Score (TSS)
2. The sum of all segment scores (for example, short program + free skate) is the total competition score. No segment scores are weighted. They are simply added together cumulatively to reach the competition score.
3. The skater with the highest competition score is declared the winner.

INTERNATIONAL JUDGING SYSTEM (IJS)

SCALE OF VALUES (SOV)

The scale of values (SOV) assigns a specific base value to each technical element reflective of its difficulty. A group of experts, including experienced skaters and coaches, determined the base values for each element, most of which are listed below.

During a skating performance, the technical specialist identifies each technical element for the judging panel by “calling” the element the skater performs.

The called element receives the base value listed below. The judge then evaluates the quality of that element by giving it a grade of execution (GOE).

Jump and throw elements include one base value, one V value and, in some cases, one V1 value. Non-jump elements have five levels for singles, pairs and step sequences in ice dance (LB, L1, L2, L3, L4) and four levels for

all other elements in ice dance (L1, L2, L3, L4) that correlate with five or four base values, respectively, and, in some cases, a V value. The values and levels are determined by edges used, number of rotations, etc. A judge still must determine a GOE for whichever element and level is called.

All competitors must be 15 years old by July 1, 2017, to be eligible for the 2018 Olympic Winter Games.

The athlete selection procedure for the 2018 Olympic Winter Games is as follows:

The 2018 U.S. Olympic Figure Skating Team will be selected following the conclusion of the 2018 Prudential U.S. Figure Skating Championships, Dec. 29, 2017 - Jan. 7, 2018, in San Jose, California. Team members will be selected by U.S. Figure Skating's International Committee, taking into consideration the results of events in the following order of importance:

2017 ISU Grand Prix of Figure Skating Final
2017 ISU World Figure Skating Championships
2017 ISU Grand Prix of Figure Skating events
2017 Four Continents Championships

Skaters who do not compete at these events due to injury or illness, but who meet the other criteria, may also be considered for selection.

HISTORY OF THE OLYMPICS

The earliest recorded Olympic Games were held at Olympia in ancient Greece in 776 B.C. This tradition took place every four years for 1,000 years.

The modern Olympic Movement started in 1894 when French educator, Pierre de Coubertin, brought together a group of sports and philosophy leaders from around the world for the International Athletic Congress. The group, which later became the International Olympic Committee (IOC), unanimously decided to revive the ancient Games. In 1896, the first modern Olympic Games were held in Athens, Greece, their country of origin.

The first winter sport included in the Olympic Games was figure skating in 1908. The first Olympic Winter Games were staged in Chamonix, France, in 1924, where 294 athletes from 16 nations took part in 14 events.

At the 2010 Olympic Winter Games in Vancouver, 2,566 (1044 women, 1522 men) from more than 82

nations competed in 86 different events. Nearly 10,000 members of the media attended the event (journalists, agencies, photographers, radio and television).

OLYMPIC TEAM EVENT

The 2018 Olympic Winter Games will feature the figure skating team event. Each member of the U.S. Olympic Figure Skating Team is eligible to compete in the team event.

U.S. Figure Skating will work with athletes/coaches to determine if the athlete will participate. Per ISU rules, the figure skating team event men's and pairs short program nominations must be received by 10 a.m. PyeongChang time on Feb. 8. Nominations for the ladies short program and short dance must be received by 10 a.m. PyeongChang time on Feb. 10. Nominations for the pairs free skate must be received by 1:15 p.m. PyeongChang time on Feb. 11. All other free skate/dance nominations must be received by 3:30 p.m. PyeongChang time on Feb. 11.

Each team will consist of one woman, one man, one pairs team and one ice dance team to be selected from athletes who have qualified in their individual disciplines. Each team, however, will be allowed to make up to two exchanges after the short program/dance.

The team event will consist of the 10 best national teams from NOCs/ISU members. The five teams with the highest number of points after the short program/dance will qualify for the free skate/dance. In the team event, athletes will receive points based on their finishes in each segment of competition. Athletes

1st - 10 placement points	2nd - 9 placement points
